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

Safe motoring and yes! Model As do like to play in the wet.




It's great to be back home.

UK Travel

Jenny and I recently spent 6-weeks driving around England, parts of Wales and Scotland. It's a nation of roundabouts – some surprisingly large with up to 4 sets of traffic lights within the roundabout. But they do keep the traffic flowing. For anyone planning a similar trip, here are a few comments.

Drivers in the UK are (mostly) unfailingly polite. Good driver etiquette is the norm. We drove almost 3000 miles (4800kms) happily without incident, the only exception being a puncture near our AirBnB accommodation in the Welsh fishing village of Conwy. To our surprise we found the rental car didn't have a spare tyre, jack or wheel-brace. A phone call to Avis confirmed their cars no longer carry a spare tyre. *Don't worry*, they said, *we'll send a mobile workshop*. On this Sunday evening a van arrived after a 2-hour drive from Chester, equipped with a full-size tyre remover, wheel-balancer and 120 litre petrol-driven compressor. Plus, a replacement tyre. We were left thinking a spare tyre would have been so much more practical.

Diesel in the UK costs £1.28-1.37/litre (NZ\$2.46-2.65), actually more expensive than petrol (around £1.27, NZ\$2.45).

Signs show speed limits in miles per hour. The national speed limit is 70mph (112kph) on motorways/dual carriage ways, 60mph on single carriageways and generally 30mph (sometimes 20mph) in built up areas.

In the Scottish Highlands, we drove on narrow single track roads in remote areas, however there were frequent "Passing Places", where a car can pull over to await an approaching vehicle. It worked well.

The North Coast 500 (NC500) is Scotland's Route 66 and considered one of the world's best coastal road trips. 500 miles of stunning coastal scenery, often deserted white beaches, whiskey distilleries, lochs, wildlife, castles, welcoming cafes, mountains, heather and magical views around many corners. Allow 14 days to fully enjoy this route. Incidentally, we heard it's popular with vintage and classic car clubs.



Looking for the Loch Ness Monster

If you request a GPS, UK rental car companies typically charge around £13.00/day (NZ\$23.00). Instead, we purchased a good TomTom satnav in London for £105.00 (NZ\$203.00), with a screen/dashboard mount. Besides guiding us unerringly to our destinations, it had a handy speed camera warning. We're sure it more than paid for itself in the first week ... UK roads have generous numbers of speed cameras. A suggestion is to also take an AA Road Atlas of Britain, giving you many pages of ultra-clear detailed maps and an overall sense of direction.

While in the UK we made several attempts to contact the Secretary of the Model A Ford Club of Great Britain. It's since transpired that John Buckley (whom we were trying to contact), was away on a long touring holiday in France, with his wife, Rita. And they were driving ... their 1930 Tudor! Now, there's a really interesting idea for a Model A adventure.

In July 1990 a small memorial trust had been formed to honour Bruce. Upon its closure in 1995, it was realised by the McLaren family and Ross Jensen that there was a need to form a permanent trust. The overall purpose of the Bruce McLaren Trust is to be a living working memorial to Bruce McLaren and the McLaren Team heritage. Bruce McLaren was born in Auckland, New Zealand in 1937 and was killed tragically whilst testing one of his cars at Goodwood circuit, England in June 1970.</p> <p>The Bruce McLaren Heritage Centre was formally opened on the 30th August 2017. Many thanks to the team at Bunce Motor Co. It was a great night.



MAFCA 2018 NATIONAL CONVENTION – Sparks Reno

Organised by Northern Californian Regional Group

This is an account of our trip to the National Convention in Reno, where over 1,000 people attended along with approx. 500 Model A's (565 registrations). That is a lot of Model A's.

Landing in San Francisco on 20 June we set off on a leisurely drive over three days to Reno. After negotiating our way out of heavy traffic, we headed for Walnut Creek for our first night. This was a lovely town where we basically had a good meal and put our head down for a good night's sleep. Our next stop was Lodi, a ghost town of its former self, where David located the Lodi Ironworks and Foundry. Stuart Jordan and David were given an insight into the inhouse production of iron-castings, quality stainless steel, carbon steel, Meehanite, grey-iron and ductile iron castings. Feeling a little hungry we were directed to the Lodi Beer Company where we had a bite to eat and quenched our thirst. If you ever visit Lodi – this is the place to go – fantastic food and ambience.

Onwards to Placerville in El Dorado County, where Buffalo Bill along with others rode the "Pony Express" in 1860. This little place had so much history including earning the name of "Hangtown" because of the numerous hangings that occurred there in 1849.

Arriving in Reno, after driving around Lake Tahoe and Carson City to name a few we were glad to relax in our room which was to home for the next week at the fabulous Nugget Hotel. This magnificent 29-storey hotel and casino always had something going on.

Saturday 23 June – We departed on a pre-convention cruise aboard the MS Dixie II (a paddlewheeler) from Zephyr Cove on Lake Tahoe. Setting off towards Emerald Bay we enjoyed a 3-course meal while listening to the onboard narration of the formation of the bay.



Sunday 24 June – This was the official start day of the Convention where we all picked up our Registration packs and quickly acquainted ourselves to where and when we were expected for certain activities. That evening we re-connected with Model A friends at the Welcome Dinner and all you can eat Pasta Buffet organised by the Sonoma A's. A 'Wheel of Fortune' enabled us to try our skills at spinning the wheel for a prize. Our party were successful in winning 2 bottles of wine which was quickly devoured with our American friends over the week.

Monday 25 June – A quick look at the Repair Tent was first on the list. Dave MacArthur and his fellow Club members from Henry's A's were busy providing a facility for those who needed to make emergency repairs or tinker with their cars. This was a day for seminars. The seminar on Model A Wiring and Troubleshooting by Alex Janke drew over 250 attendees, Brakes and Pedals by Les Andrews, Restoring a Model A and buying parts by Tom Rut and Hubley racing.

Tuesday 26 June – The Swap Meet drew a lot of interest from the Model A fraternity. All the Model A's were parked on the 4th and 5th floors of the hotel garage/carpark and this allowed for easy viewing, photos etc and also for the vehicle judging. We also went on a daytime Tahoe cruise which was magnificent after previously seeing the lake by night. A good get-together of friends in hot sunny weather.

Wednesday 27 June – A fabulous day as we were one of the lucky ones who secured a seat on the bus tour to the Fallon Naval Air Station. This was a private tour of the facility for the movie 'Top Gun' including the control tower and air park, four bombing ranges, the electronic warfare range and all of its other excellent training facilities. Following the tour we were treated to lunch in the Officers Mess, where we were well catered for with a Mongolian BBQ, a salad bar or a 3-course meal. These were followed by an ice-cream, a choice of many flavours, as well as a selection of toppings e.g. nuts, sprinkles etc.

“ My next car was the finest of my youth. A 1929 Model A Ford ute. It had been a roadster but a previous owner had cut it down to be a hot-rod ute. Painted sky blue with bright red axles and diff etc., and white pin-striping, it had 16 inch wheels and had been slightly “warmed up” with a lightened flywheel, Ford Ten distributor and a sports coil. The rear wheels had mudgrip tyres and the front wheels had no mudguards. It was a thing of beauty to an 18-year-old. Model A Fords were an amazing vehicle and there was a folklore of sorts around them. Some of this lore had it that they would run on one cylinder, take off and climb hills in top gear and never get stuck. Over the years I tried most of these things.

Disaster of sorts happened after about a year of ownership when a garage

proprietor refused to give me a warrant of fitness because no mudguards on the front was unsafe. He was a complete arsehole as far as I was concerned who only wanted to make money out of me. I asked Dad about it and he was of the same view. Anyway I was cornered so he got some proper mudguards and a bumper from a wrecker and bolted them on at considerable cost, to a kid, before he issued the WOF. While I had these unwanted appendages on my car Wayne and I decided it would give us an opportunity to test the one

cylinder legend.


We went out to the Te Rapa straight, Wayne crouched on the new mudguard and I set off in the car. When we got up to about 30mph Wayne started pulling the spark plug leads off the engine until only one was left on. Of course it started to slow down but it did indeed run on one cylinder with the engine firing about every twenty yards down the road. We pulled up and laughed for ages.

I had that car in all sorts of places and never did get it stuck. Another day we tried the top gear theory on Lake Road hill. Wayne and I again. Took off in top gear and went right to the top with no difficulty at all.

In another coincidence it turned out that the model A had previously been owned by a man named Peter Hawke who would later in life end up being my boss in the police. Peter was a detective sergeant on Housebreaks Squad in the early 70s when I was a trainee detective. He often used to say to me that he had owned the Model A but I didn't believe him as I thought he was mistaken about which car it was. We often had a good natured argument about it over a beer. It was only when I was nearing retirement that I found out that it was the same car and I haven't seen him for some years to apologise.



Horn Basics

by Paul R. Modlin



Oiling


Tools and Supplies:

- Flat blade screw driver
- Scotch Bright Pad (or similar)
- Sewing Machine Oil
- Kerosene
- Toothpicks

Procedure:

1. Remove the dirt build up from the **Upper and Lower Oiling Felts**. Clean with kerosene and pad dry.
2. Polish the **Commutator** with a Scotch Bright Pad. Clean between the gaps with a toothpick.
3. Apply two drops of sewing machine oil to both the **Upper and Lower Oiling Felts**.
4. Lightly grease the upper and lower tips of the **Motor shaft**, as well as the bottom of the **Ratchet**.

Problems and Solutions



Brush Spring

Problem: The spring is too strong. The friction of the brush on the commutator will not allow the motor to turn freely.

Or the opposite: The spring tension is too light. The brushes are not making a good electrical contact.



Fix: Replace spring.

Gasket

Problem: The gaskets are missing. There should be one on each side of the diaphragm.


Fix: Replace gaskets.

Bruce Snowsill

26 August 1947 – 10 June 2018



We were saddened to receive a call recently from Karol Snowsill in Tokoroa, to say her husband, Bruce, had passed away.

Bruce & Karol have been Club members since 2005. We asked Karol if she would send some details relating to Bruce's great interest in Ford Model A's and AA's.

Thank you Karol for sending the following, with a photo of Bruce.

Bruce became interested in Model A Fords when his father bought the first family vehicle. Bruce was 8. He was off school with a broken toe and his mother, who could barely drive, took him to visit some farming neighbours in the Model A. She managed to drive a distance before stalling it in a ford. She walked home in disgust, leaving young Bruce to sort it out. Sort it out he did, driving home standing on the floor, looking through the steering wheel. This was 1955, when the family lived on Ongaroto Road between Atiamuri and Whakamaru.

After that, Bruce spent every spare moment under and around the Model A, until he knew every inch of it. He bought his first Model A Pickup (a car conversion) just before he was 15. He got his licence and the rest of his teenage years were spent hunting and fishing, taking the Model A to the most impossible places around the central North Island.

He owned 4 Pickups, the last from 1969 to 1970. During that time we got married and used the Pickup as a wedding car. Bruce's sisters covered the newly painted vehicle with "Just Married" written in white shoe polish.

Another time an uncle, a motor dealer in Hamilton, arrived with a new Trekka he wanted to sell to Bruce. He met Bruce in the bush to demonstrate the qualities of the Skoda-powered Trekka. Bruce said he'd buy it, as long as the Trekka would go where the Model A would go. They were driving along and Bruce pointed to a slope, asking his uncle if the Trekka would go up there. His uncle looked a bit worried and said "No". So they decided to go back and pick up the Model A, in which Bruce proceeded to demonstrate it could handle hilly terrain with ease. Likely also helped by his intuitive driving skills.

About 2000, Bruce and his good mate Alan came home with big smiles. They had just bought a 1930 Model AA Truck. It was about to arrive on the back of a tow truck. It took Bruce and Alan 5 years to completely strip and rebuild it. They used it as a float in the Tokoroa Christmas Parade.

Failing health meant the truck was stored in the garage, just to be admired.

Bruce was a gentle, caring, helpful, humble man. He will be missed by all his friends and family.
