2019 Te Anau Rally

For anyone interested in shipping their Model A, Auckland – Lyttelton (ex Fergusson Container Wharf), I've had quotes from Pacifica Shipping and Cubic Transport. A 40-foot container (2 cars) would be around \$2200.00 inclusive GST (one-way). The container is loaded off-site and trucked to the wharf (extra cost). Tie-downs within the container keep the cars secure. Another option is a Mitsui O.S.K. Lines, Roll-on/Roll-off (Ro Ro) ship. Some of us used this cost-effective service for the 2015 Wanaka Rally, however you are not able to drive your car on/off the ship. You have to be prepared to trust wharf staff in Auckland and Lyttelton to do this. Kiwi Rail is another option, however more expensive than shipping (over \$4000.00, one-way for a 40-foot container).

Name badges

If your Club name badge has the pin-type clasp at the back and you would prefer a magnetic clasp, let me know and I'll send you the latter. They're self-adhesive, so easy to change.

London T-Charge

This is a bit beyond range, however the new London T (Toxicity) Charge requires cars and other vehicles to meet minimum exhaust emission charges, or pay £10.00 daily (in addition to the London Congestion Charge of £11.50 – \pounds 14.00/day). Exempt are cars 40 years and older, so here's the tongue-in-cheek bit – if you're planning to ship your Model A to the UK for some sightseeing, relax about the new London T-Charge.

All Club bills, subs, name badges, are up-to-date. Jenny and I are now away for a few weeks ... some UK driving (in a modern) and narrow-boating are on the agenda. Club Visit to Eden Garden

Sir Frank and Lady Mappin were most generous benefactors of Auckland. Eden Garden, a disused quarry, was part of their estate. Club member Liz Somervaille, their granddaughter, attended with her husband Graham and spoke at our meeting. (Their lovely yellow A and the Levinson's A graced the sealed area inside the garden)

The fascinating story of Sir Frank Mappin is well worth Googling. Briefly, in 1969 the Mappins, who were dedicated garden lovers and employed three gardeners on their extensive parklike Epsom property, gifted their outstanding home and gardens to the Crown as a residence for the Governor General. Today it is known as Government House.



Liz spoke to the Club of her childhood in the 1950's. Roaming around her Grandparent's estate with her cousins, playing in the gardens and lava caves. Interestingly, during World War 11 the caves were used to hide the Auckland War Memorial artefacts and valuables when invasion was a possibility.

Horticulturalist Jack Clark, in 1964, took on the task of leading the conversion of the quarry into a garden. With the help of many volunteers, also Periodic Detention workers - paths, rock walls and gardens were established. Today Eden Garden is listed as a New Zealand garden of national significance. Certainly, well worth a return visit.

Alan Minson, Club Founder and Life Member

Alan spoke about how our club was formed. He grew up in Christchurch and wanted to buy a car when he left school. Fortunately, a wise cousin steered him away from buying a Fiat 500 and recommended a Model A. A battered 1930 Town Sedan was acquired for 47 Pounds and in 1965 he joined the Canterbury Model A Club. Later a Phaeton was purchased for 17 Pounds and 10 shillings. Interestingly the Canterbury club was the first in the world outside the United States to be an affiliated chapter of the Model A Ford Club of America.

By 1972 Alan was living in Auckland and had joined the Auckland VCC. Many VCC members at that time were disdainful of Model A's. For this reason, he decided to form a local Model A Club. Alan advised the next Auckland VCC meeting of his intention and invited any A owners present to join him. At the end of the meeting 9 other A owners asked to join. Later I asked him why the words North Island were included rather than, say, Northern or Auckland? Because it was known that there were pockets of A ownership in the North Island, and as there was no other N.I. club, they did not want these people discouraged from joining. Early club members mentioned included Warrick Woollams, Rene Dunn, Bob Pipe. The club had regular events and sourcing, exchanging, parts helped expedite restorations. Later, Alan presented new members with their club badges. Alan Minson is a name mentioned fondly over the years and it was a pleasure to hear him address the club.

John Castle, Life Member

John mentioned the early days of the club using late 1970's newsletters to illustrate his points. Members were younger then and things were simpler with for example away events involving camping rather than motels. Club meetings were held at MOTAT until internal MOTAT bickering made it better to leave. John mentioned an article in 1979 from Auckland VCC where regret was shown for the growth of one make car clubs... Too late!

Alan's and John's talks evoked memories of humorous Model A incidents from the large audience. Trish and Robert Brown, Terry Costello, David Mossman shared stories and minor breakdown moments now happy in retrospect. The aim of the meeting was to visit a beautiful garden, mix with newish members and learn about club early days.

Another good day for our club.


There was a good attendance of members and everyone enjoyed

After having read your article in the magazine about Solving an Intermittent Ignition Problem by Woody Hardman I recognised that we had had exactly the same problem on our Model A, it resolved itself to be the fuse holder that you have pictured on page 22 not usually on Australian cars of the day but a US idea. The sheet metal clips at each end of the fuse did not always make good clean contact with the fuse and would often show up as miss firing when going up a hill but good on the flat.



The answer was to connect the ignition lead direct to the terminal on the starter motor and hurl the fuse and fuse holder onto the scrap heap. Problem solved!

Handbrake Award?

For the benefit of any new members to the Club – you may hear of the handbrake award (or be one of the privileged to win it).

What is it?

The Model A Handbrake mounted on a stand is brought along to Club Events and gatherings by the present incumbent. It is awarded for 'Bloopers' and the like. All in good fun. It has been in the Club for a while now.

From the Archive:

Don't Be Fooled!

During the process of restoring a Model A Ford every restorer will eventually have to purchase some parts for the car either new, used, or of the replacement type. Some of these parts may be original parts, however, the majority of them will be of the replacement type handled by dealers. Restorers not having a complete and thorough knowledge of the construction of their car and not having another identical car to guide themselves with, will run into difficulties of identifying certain parts to be used in their restoration project.

It is important to be very careful when buying parts because, in some cases, it is very easy to end up with parts that won't fit, or with parts on the car which are not the correct ones for the year of the car being restored. In some cases, authenticity can be retained by rebuilding certain parts using a rebuilding kit instead of trying to locate a certain part which could turn out to be the wrong one or one that is not authentic. This applies to tail lights, water pumps, oil pumps, and carburetors.

Here is a list of some of the things to be considered when purchasing parts:

- The clutch assembly, including housing, disc, pressure plate, and release bearing on early 1928 models are entirely different than those used on late 1928 to 1931.
- 2—The speedometer cable and housing assembly for '28/29 differs from the '30/31. The '28/29 has a keyed end while the '30/31 has a square end where the cable joins the drive.
- 3—The steering sector gear on early 1928 models has seven teeth as opposed to two teeth on the later models. Also, the bushings and gasket sets are different.
- 4—The main drive gear A7017AR is used only on the early 1928 multiple disc clutch.
- 5-The radiator emblem on the 1931 differs from the
- 6-The radiator on the '28/29 differs from the '30/31.
- 7—The line from the gas tank to sediment bulb on the '28/29 differs from the '30/31. The line between the shut-off valve and the carburetor sediment bulb on the late 1931 is shaped different than any other year.
- 8-Cowl light lenses on '28/29 differ from '30/31.
- 9—Most replacement dash light assemblies are not necessarily authentic. The available replacements are for use on the heart shaped dash found on most '28/29 and early 1930 models.
- 10—The 1928 Powerhouse generator requires different brushes and bearings than those used on 1929 to 1931 generators.
- 11—The '28/29 head light focus spring and screw are different than the '30/31 types.
- 12—The stop light switch on '28/29 models is mounted on the transmission and is different than the '30/31.
- 13—The body mounted tail light found on many '28/29 cars (beer can) differs from the later models, and though interchangeable, the original lenses are different than those used on later tail lights.
- 14—Bumper center clamp differs between '28/29 and '30/31.

- 15—The welting around the gas tank is of smaller diameter bead than the welting used around the fenders.
- 16—Cowl lacing kits of '28/29 differ from those used on '30/31.
- 17—Door handles used on closed body style '28/29 models differ from the '30/31 models.
- 18—1928/29 gas caps and radiator caps differ from '30/31 and the gas cap must have a vent.
- 19—Hood clamps on '28/29 are a three-hole type, '30/31 is a two-hole type.
- 20-Hub caps differ from '28/29 to '30/31.
- 21—Running board matting and trim of the '28/29 models differs from the '30/31 models.
- 22—Hand brake lever pawls and lever sectors are not all alike for all years.
- 23—Radius rod socket sets were originally all steel, the newer replacement sets using a rubber ball make an easier installation.
- 24—Steering wheels and horn rods on '28/29 models differ from the '30/31 models.
- 25—Sedans, pickups, and commercial cars used a 12-leaf front spring, others used a 10-leaf spring.
- 26—Some replacement crankshaft ratchets require the use of a larger wrench than the original.
- 27-Chrome plated oil filler caps are not authentic.
- 28—Carburetor sediment bulbs on the late 1931 are not like the '28/29/30/early-31 and flat firewall models.
- 29—Tillotson carburetors are not authentic, but they are a good replacement.
- 30—Zenith carburetor gaskets are available as a kit or individually and are included in all carburetor rebuilding kits. All individual components such as shafts, screws, etc., are readily available.
- 31—Starter motors in early 1928 require a different Bendix spring and bolt set than the later ones.
- 32—Powerhouse generator pulleys are a different size than those used later.
- 33-1928/29 choke rods differ from the '30/31 type.
- 34-The battery cable grommet is the same as the ignition
- 35—1928/29 head light bars and radiator shells are different than those used in '30/31.
- 36—Speedometer décal sets are currently available for the '30/31 round face type only.
- 37—1928/29 windwing clamps for open cars differ from the '30/31 style.
- 38-Windshield wiper motors are not all alike.
- 39-1928/29 front shield stud sets are different than '30/31.
- 40—1928/29 open car windshield frame rubber differs from 30/31.
- 41—Door bottom weather strip for open cars currently available is for '30/31.
- 42-The 8-inch door sill plates are used on coupes.
- 43-1928/29 battery cover plates differ from '30/31.
- 44—Trim screw sets differ from model to model and from '28/29 to '30/31.
- 45—Touring cars, coupes, sedans, and pickups used an 8leaf rear spring. Roadsters used a 7-leaf rear spring.

The above listing of differences is not a complete list, but it should suffice to make a restorer wary that there are differences and that he should proceed carefully throughout the restoration process \bullet



Transporting of Model A's to National Convention April 2019, Te Anau South Island



Hello to all Model A Ford Club Members.

With regards to methods of getting a car to Te Anau when one has limited time available I used a Japanese Car Carrier to ship two cars from Auckland to Christchurch prior to the Wanaka Rally in 2015. It worked for me with regards to costs and time and the fact I could not drive two cars at the same time! Ralph Levinson and John Castle also used the system and I believe it was good for them too – the shipping company and contact is contained on the next page.

Please note this is a one-way service only as the ships sail from Lyttleton back to Japan direct. I do have the ship schedule for this year if you wish to enquire.

We arranged for Model A'ers to collect the cars at Lyttleton wharf directly from memory (rather than as per the instructions from the shipping company) and take to their homes/garages/sheds etc for our arrival from Auckland. I think a few drinks were charged for this service.

The only negative I ran into was that the gearbox in my Sports Coupe had a horror failure within 40 miles of arriving in Christchurch. This car did have a harsh clutch and a lot 'slack' in the drive train with a Borg Warner overdrive and perhaps a person with limited skill took it onto / off the ship and ??? We were able to get the car back on the road within 6 hours with generous assistance from Canterbury Model A community so it did not stop a lot of our activities or disrupt our schedule – it did growl a fair bit !!

It is not my intent to use this service this time around so if anyone is keen to I suggest they put their hands up and contact the shipping company, along with any other Model A folk who may wish to join them.

Trust this helps and is off assistance to you all.

We just need the make, model along with either rego or vin number to make a booking.

Please kindly see below conditions:

- Vehicle must be able to operate under their own power & have working steering & brakes (for self-mobile units).
- No leaking fluids, oils.
- No loose / hanging parts on exterior of vehicle.
- No broken glass in the interior.
- Cargo must be free of any contamination/soil as per Biosecurity standards.
- Subject to MOL standard terms and conditions.
- Subject to space at the time of booking.

Any vehicles that do not meet these conditions will be shut out at shippers account.

Attached is our current schedule to get an idea of when vessels sail. With delays out of Japan ay present these do change a bit and can pass on a new schedule closer to sailing dates if needed.

Jim's Technical Tip

Winter Tyre Pressures

If you drive your Model A in the winter, and I hope you can, remember to check the tyre pressure when the mercury drops. Cold temperatures make the air pressure in the tyres go down. Low tyre pressure makes steering harder, and lowers your gas mileage. You may notice a little bit of a vibration, due to flat spot on the tyres, when you first start driving. These should go away as the tyres roll and the rubber warms up.

FILL THE FLASK – just in time for Winter

(Take into the workshop, or on an outing in the 'A' for an easy yummy lunch)

Broccoli and Potato Soup

(recipe from Countdown)



- 40g butter
- 1 onion, sliced
- 3 potatoes, peeled, chopped
- 1.5L vegetable stock
- 1 bity leaf
- 1 broccoli head, roughly chopped
- 1½ cups frozen peas
- · Salt and pepper, to season
- · 2 Tbsp cream
- 2 Tosp roasted almonds, chopped
- · Chopped Italian parsley to serve
- Crusty bread, to serve



- Heat a large saucepan on medium and melt the butter. Add onions and saute for 4-5 minutes, until tender.
- Add potatoes, stock and bay leaf. Bring to a boil on high. Boil for 5 minutes.
- 8 Reduce heat to medium. Add broccoli and simmer, covered, for 2 minutes. Stir in peas and simmer for another minute.
- O Transfer to a large heatproof bowl and discard the bay leaf. Using a blender, purée ingredients until smooth. Season to taste.
- Orizile soup with cream, then top with almonds and parsley. Serve with crusty bread.


Tip: You can make it dairy free by replacing butter with olive oil and omitting the cream.




