



Transporting of Model As to South Island

Faced with a dilemma of time constraints and wanting to attend the Wanaka National Rally in 2015 we decided to have our car taken by road transporter to Wellington and returned the same way from Christchurch. There was an option of sea transport via a ship to Lyttleton, but I could not meet the deadline for this and it also required a driver and storage at Christchurch. Rail was another possibility but the car had to be in a container at considerable expense.

Economically the road transport option compares favourably with fuel and accommodation costs for the same journey.

After delivering the Tudor to a depot in Onehunga, Trish and I flew to Wellington a couple of days later. Lo and behold Henrietta was waiting at the Bluebridge terminal when we arrived. Also waiting was an alarming and unusual pool of oil under the car. This from a Model A that is normally well behaved in that department. Other than an oil change at Wanaka almost no oil was used on the trip. I can only assume the car sat on a steep angle for a long time.

After delivery to the Christchurch depot on a Monday afternoon the car was back at Onehunga on Thursday. On collection I found that the luggage rack had collapsed, leaving the trunk hanging by a padlock and strop the truck driver had added. Both back seat squabs were on the floor between the seats. Because the transport company asks that no loose items be stored in the car, things like a spare generator had been put in the trunk so perhaps it was overloaded.

The moral of the story is that if you are thinking of sending your Model A to the South Island via road transport, then accept that it will have a rough ride and possibly be parked at a steep angle for many hours. It also has to be started and driven by someone else on and off the ferry. Knowing the force needed to eject the back seat squabs, I am amazed that the journey could be that rough.

I doubt if I would use a car transporter to take our Model A long distance again. Perhaps if a group wants to use this option for Te Anau, then a deal could be arranged with guaranteed placement on trailers for a hopefully a safer journey.


The 1930's Huapai, Auckland

'Women and the Marque'

SUNDAY 11 FEBRUARY 2018



One hundred years of iconic cars on show from around 70 Auckland car clubs; rare and valuable classic, historic, vintage and new vehicles were all on display but unfortunately gumboots and umbrellas were the order of the day. It was so unfortunate the weather was not in our favour but the spirit of the Club and its members were evident. This was the first year that the Club has displayed 2 Model A's in the ring; Glenn Morris (1929 Phaeton) and Stuart Jordan (1930 Roadster), and it was evident by the interest these cars received that people still appreciate their value and uniqueness.

While these cars and their owners kept dry the 5 remaining cars and their owners braved the wet weather mixing and mingling with the genuinely interested car enthusiasts. Bruce Stratton displayed his 1929 Tudor rolling chassis which he has so meticulously restored. This was on display under the Club gazebo and drew a lot of attention. People were very appreciative at being able to take a close look at the workings of these cars and to see Dads explaining to their son's how a car works when driving and what is connected to what. The Club entrants Errol McAlpine (1928 Pickup), Ralph Levinson (1930 Phaeton), Steve Driver (1929 Woody), Hugh Hulse (1930 Fordor) and David Mossman (1930 Tudor) rounded off the display by the North Island Model A Ford Club.





Thank you to all those Club Members who gave their time to this event and also for the assistance shown to many other clubs when their cars were stuck in mud and needed a push. One of the highlights of the day was watching David Mossman tow a 2½ ton Australian owned Packard, previously owned by Amelia Earhart, out of the mud with his Model A. No sweat to a Model A with the owner of the Packard (Ross Marshall) suggesting that no photos be taken of a Model A towing a Packard. His instructions of course were not obeyed. This was a successful day, weather aside, with many people enquiring about the Club and lots agreeing that these cars were good basic cars where you were able to work on them yourself and did not have to ask a computer guru how to fix them. This was about getting our name out there and we were successful. Stick to the basics guys and you sure will have fun.

Amelia Earhart's Packard – towed by Model A Tudor



New Zealanders had the chance to see the car that pilot Amelia Earhart never got to pick up.

The priceless Packard was custom-built for the aviation pioneer, but she left it at the airport in 1937 when she embarked on the around-the-world trip she never completed.

Its history took many twists from then on.

Ms Earhart mysteriously disappeared on the flight in 1937. The car too had disappeared, but its mystery has now been solved - both her initials, A and E, were marked on the bumper of the car.

Packard is the US' answer to Rolls Royce - two-and-a-half tonnes of luxury. One of just 12 of the model built in 1935 the Packard drives like a dream.

Ms Earhart garaged the car at the airport when she embarked on her ill-fated journey.

"Theoretically she got out of that car and into the aircraft, and this really was her last living asset in the world today," says owner Ross Marshall.

There are dozens of theories about what happened to Ms Earhart. Did she starve to death on a remote atoll, or did she spy on the Japanese military build-up, only to be taken prisoner? "Had she got this information back to the government, Pearl Harbour may never have happened," says Mr Marshall.

Ms Earhart's widower sold the Packard to a notorious gangster before a judge got hold of it. He tinkered with it for 50 years. Then Mr Marshall, an Australian, offered to swap it with a Buick, even before he learned its story.

"The car in its self is a treasure anyway, but to have such a history is just breath-taking," he says. Mr Marshall shipped the Packard back to Australia and took 10 years to restore it. The 1920s One Hour Dress for Beginners

A month before the Art Deco Festival in Napier, I decided to take on the challenge of making the 1920s one-hour dress. After searching a few websites I decided to try http://theclosethistorian.blogspot.co.nz/2016/05/make-your-own-1920s-1-hour-dress-step-1.html which was a modern take on the Mary Brooks Picken original version.

First step is to take measurements bust and the length of the total dress length, second the measurements for the overall dress length and third from the shoulder to the desired waistline and third the measurements from the hips and sleeves. The overall pattern is essentially a rectangle with extra extensions for the sleeves and hip fullness.

Next cutting out the pattern and this is where I went wrong. I was supposed to cut the front and back of the dress using the same pattern on the fold. But some reason I doubled the width of the front and back of the dress. So I carried on sewing the dress and when I showed it to my husband I realised the dress could fit both of us at the same time! So after re-cutting I was back on track to sewing up the dress to the right size for me. One dress down I decided to tackle a dress with a border print pattern. After 4 days of sewing I had two dresses ready for day wear at the Art Deco festival. So what did I learn from my on- hour dress experience, **check and double check your measurements.**

Make a mock-up of the pattern first and if possible a mock-up of the dress, Its essential to add a seam allowance.

And as for making the dress in one hour? well maybe the machine sewing could be completed in one hour but this didn't include any hand sewing of necklines, creating different necklines, sleeves, sashes or any embellishments.

Would I make the one-hour dress again, yes I would now I have the confidence to try different styles.
